

1. What's Happening In Your Area

Drugs – Ongoing core priority - Intelligence – We continue to review and act on drugs intelligence. For operational and data protection reasons we are unable to give specific details of locations / premises or persons that we are currently investigating. We have been working with other agencies to tackle individuals of concern linked to drug misuse.

We ask that you **report any concerns** around drugs misuse that you have. You may have information that adds to an ongoing concern, and this can really help when we apply for Warrants. You can speak to us at Hornsea Police Station in confidence or alternatively report anonymously via 'CrimeStoppers' at https://crimestoppers-uk.org/

Local Residential Homes – Ongoing Liaison

Hornsea officers continue with weekly drop-in sessions to several of our care establishments within the town. A proportion of reported crimes relate to individuals who may be suffering a mental health episode. It is our intention to reduce incidents of reported missing persons and potential offending by engaging with staff and residents at the earliest opportunity.

ASB - Off road bikes and electric scooters

We have received several reports from residents regarding off-road bikes and electric scooters being ridden dangerously in and around Hornsea. Often on footpaths, swerving in and out of pedestrians including children. Those involved appear to be young males wearing tracksuit type clothing with black balaclavas.

To address this, we will continue to carry out Humber talking to identify any specific areas where the bikes and scooters are going. Along with our patrol colleagues we will complete regular patrols through the areas identified. We will act on information naming the individuals responsible and deal with any offences/suspect appropriately and robustly.

Theft of tools from vans – Hornsea town and surrounding areas

Over recent weeks, we have received 4 reports of vans being broken into and valuable tools being stolen. Many of these are high value power tools. All thefts have been carried out under the cover of darkness. It is likely that a vehicle is being used in the transportation of the tools.

We will be increasing high visibility patrols in the evening and early hours of the morning and continue to use MyCommunityAlert to send residents target hardening advice regarding leaving high value tools in vehicles overnight. We will continue to view CCTV and consider forensic opportunities to identify those responsible.

HumberTalking

Humber Talking is still being undertaken in the North Holderness area.

We will be speaking with householders on their doorstep however if you would rather participate online and highlight any issues you think the Police should be dealing with, please visit the website.

What is Humber talk?

Launched in 2018, Humber Talking is aiming to understand the needs of our local communities across Hull, East Yorkshire and Northern Lincolnshire.

It enables residents to meet local officers face-to-face and to share any concerns. Our aim is to hear the views of every single household across our force area.

3. Crimes of note

01/06/2025 - Today the Rural Task Force have patrolled the Yorkshire coast to deter Rural Crime & Anti Social Behaviour during the school half term holidays. A call from a local river keeper resulted in 2 x males detained for illegal fishing & promptly dealt with.

05/06/2025 - Operation Coastline at Hornsea

Community Patrol Sergeant Ps Mandy Inman has been walking the beat again this weekend on Op Coastline in Hornsea. This time covering over 11 miles and over 27,000 steps.



Community Patrol Sergeant Mandy Inman said: "I engaged with the general public and local businesses - including convenience stores and members of the public - while addressing concerns raised by the community. Throughout my shift, I provided assistance and reassurance where needed, reinforcing our commitment to improving community safety across the region.

"The feedback from the public on the streets has been very positive and supportive, which is great to hear. With an increased police presence, Op Coastline remains a proactive initiative to deter criminal activity, support local communities, and work alongside partner agencies to promote a safe and welcoming environment for all."

13/06/2025 - Today the team have been conducting a roadside check point day conducting checks on vehicles, trailers, caravans & plant machinery for roadworthiness & stolen markers. Road traffic offences were dealt with & crime prevention advice provided.

16/06/2025 - Man sentenced for series of sexual exposures from Hull to Hornsea

A 'perverted' man who repeatedly exposed himself in the areas of Hedon, Hull and Hornsea and performed sexual acts on himself in public, has been sentenced to 18 months suspended for two years, been handed a Sexual





Harm Prevention Order for ten years, and ordered to pay costs following his appearance at Hull Crown Court today (Monday, 16 June).

Mark Stuart, 28-years-old, of The Garth in Cottingham was initially charged with eight counts of exposure and outraging public decency in connection with multiple reports in August and September 2023.



We received multiple reports from women who had seen the same man, matching the same descriptions exposing himself, hiding in bushes and performing sexual acts on himself in an attempt to intimidate the women, who were alone going about their daily business walking their dogs or jogging.

Following a CCTV appeal, Stuart was identified as being responsible for indecently exposing himself

and further lines of enquiry also placed him in the area at the same time as the offences were reported to have taken place.

5. Scams / Crime Prevention / Public Safety

Impersonation Fraud

Humberside Police would like to make everybody aware of Impersonation Fraud (aka Courier Fraud), please see below for details.

The Police of bank will never send someone to your house to collect money, bank cards or ask you to withdraw money from a bank, ATM or supermarket exchange. If they do, it will actually be a criminal trying to scam you.

Criminals will often tell you not to speak to anyone else about the investigation and promise you will get your money back.

They may ask you to lie to your bank or bypass security measures - it is essential that you follow any warnings from your bank and never lie to them.

They may offer to send a courier to collect your money, or bank card and PIN, They will ask you to write down your PIN and place it in a separate envelope to that of your card.

- *Never hand over your card: Your bank or police will never ring you to tell you they are coming to your home to pick up money or your card. Never hand these over to anyone who comes to collect it.
- *Take five to stop and think: Criminals are experts at impersonating banks, trusted organisations or the police. They will try to rush and panic you into responding to their requests. Its ok to reject, refuse or ignore these requests.



*Always speak to your bank securely: If you're contacted out of the blue, you can always call your bank back on a number you know to be correct. Hang up and wait five minutes before you call your bank, as criminals may stay on the line. Alternatively, use a different line altogether to call your bank.

Community Speedwatch

Community Speedwatch (CSW) is a national initiative where, in partnership with the police, members of communities use detection devices to monitor local vehicle speeds.

The volunteers report drivers exceeding the speed limit to the police with the aim of educating drivers to slow down.

If the data proves a driver is ignoring repeated warnings police can prosecute them. The aim is to:

- reduce death and injury on the roads
- improve the quality of life for local communities
- reduce the speed of vehicles to the speed limit
- increase public awareness of inappropriate speed

Community Speedwatch does not result in prosecution itself. However, if a persistent speeding driver is identified through the scheme, police can use this evidence to take action against them if required. If there is a persistent general speeding issue where highway improvements are required (eg speed bumps), the relevant agency will be contacted.

To become part of CSW, please go to <u>CSW Online</u> to register and for more information. CSW Online works on behalf of the police and communities to organise and coordinate CSW activity.

Volunteers receive training, and neighbourhood policing team staff will support them.

12/06/2025 - Week of action to tackle knife crime sees 85 weapons seized Sceptre - In May, we took part in Sceptre, as part of the National Police Chiefs Council's (NPCC) week of activity that sees police forces intensify their efforts in tackling knife crime and raising awareness of the devastating impact it can have.

Previously known as 'Operation Sceptre', running from 12 to 19 May, this national week of action focused on proactive policing efforts through early intervention, education and prevention, with our officers working with partner agencies across communities to protect those most at risk from knife crime.

Over the course of the week, officers conducted 61 community engagements, delivered 40 safety demonstrations at schools, 34 weapons sweeps, 9 weapons disruption visits and a number of patch walks were completed across the force.



Ninja swords banned by summer 2025

In a further move to break the cycle of young people carrying knives and to better protect the public from knife-related crime, from 1 August, ninja swords will be banned. This will make it illegal to possess, manufacture, import or sell these deadly weapons.

The majority of ninja swords have a blade between 14 inches and 24 inches with one straight cutting edge with a tanto style point. From 1 August, anyone caught in possession of a ninja sword in private could face 6 months in prison, and this will later increase to 2 years under new measures in the Crime and Policing Bill. There is already a penalty of up to 4 years in prison for carrying any weapon in public.

Ahead of the ban coming into place, the government, in partnership with law enforcement and members of the Coalition to Tackle Knife Crime, will run its most ambitious surrender scheme yet. The scheme will run across the country, targeting young people most vulnerable to knife crime.

The surrender scheme will run from 1 to 31 July to allow any member of the public to hand in these weapons safely.

20/06/2025 - Officers from the Regional Underwater Search Unit are echoing the messages that Humberside Fire & Rescue Service (HRFS) shared yesterday regarding water safety.

Sarah Wilkinson, Head of Prevention for HFRS, said: "Our water safety campaign is all about equipping people with the knowledge they need to enjoy the water safely. Tragically, in recent years, young lives have been lost at local waterways, despite the heroic efforts of our firefighters and emergency service teams. As the warmer weather draws us to the water, it's crucial to understand the risks, particularly cold-water shock, which can have deadly consequences."



With the period of warm weather set to continue and get hotter over the weekend, the Regional Underwater Search Unit expect to receive an increase in calls for service, relating to people who have got into difficulty whilst swimming in open water locations, sadly resulting in tragic

consequences. In preparation of this, the unit are increasing their presence in beauty hotspots, that frequently attract members of the public to swim, during periods of warm weather.

"Swimming in open areas of water comes with a substantial amount of risk' PC Liam Whittington from the Underwater search team explains. 'Open water areas are not controlled environments, the water conditions can vary, open water can be fast moving and have invisible underwater currents. Some water ways are heavily polluted and can be harmful even simply coming into contact with the skin can cause damage, with more serious damage caused from ingesting this dirty water. "Other hazards such as entrapments can be caused by logs, weed, or even submerged cars and scaffolding poles that can't be seen from the water surface, these hazards can quickly trap or injure a swimmer and put them in danger extremely fast.

"A big factor in most of the incidents we attend relates to cold water shock'. This is a sudden shock to the body caused by immersion into cold water. It is very common during warm periods when people see the appeal of wanting to cool off in water and jump or dive into the water without first checking the conditions. Sometimes that water can be significantly colder than expected and the sudden rapid change in body temperatures causes the body to very quickly become fatigued to even the strongest of swimmers.

"Our message during the summer, as always is to be aware of these risks when visiting areas of open water and follow the HFRS guidance whenever possible."



Horses on the roads

Now that the warmer weather has arrived we can expect to see more equestrians using the roads.

Here are some key points to remember if you come across a horse on the road:

Please slow down to a maximum of 10MPH

Please be patient- don't rev your engine or sound your horn



Pass at a safe distance give at least 2 meters of space between your car and the horse if the road allows

Only pass the horse when it is safe to do so

Please do not accelerate quickly after passing the horse, drive away slowly.

"Passing wide and slow" can help to avoid startling horses and can prevent accidents occurringensuring the safety of the horse, rider, and driver.

Riders-

Although it is not stated in the Highway Code, the importance of hi viz clothing being worn by horse and rider cannot be stressed enough! This improves how visible you are to oncoming traffic significantly, meaning there is more chance of traffic spotting you sooner and passing safely.

Protect your heart and finances: spot the signs of Romance Fraud

Data from the National Fraud Intelligence Bureau (NFIB) reveals a disturbing 9% increase in romance fraud reports in the past year, with 9,449 reports made in the 2024/25 financial year. On average, victims lost £11,222 each—proof of the emotionally devastating and financially ruinous impact of these crimes.



In Humberside alone, there were 120 reports of romance fraud in the 2024/25 financial year, resulting in total losses exceeding £1.5 million.

Romance and befriending fraud is a type of scam where Fraudsters build emotional relationships with victims online by pretending to be romantic partners or close friends. Over time, the fraudster gains the victims trust and eventually begins to ask for money, under false pretences like a personal emergency, travel costs or investment opportunities.



Yorkshire & Humber Regional Fraud Protect Team said: "Romance Fraud is a deeply personal and devastating crime that goes far beyond financial loss, it exploits trust, emotion and human vulnerability.

"Victims of Romance Fraud are often left feeling ashamed, isolated and emotionally betrayed which can make it even harder to come forward.

"We want to make one thing clear, there is no shame in reporting this type of scam: these scammers are highly manipulative, calculated and professional."

The challenge for many families and friends of romance fraud victims is being able to disrupt the false reality created by the fraudster, to enable the victim to see the situation for what it really is – a fraud.

Stay vigilant and protect yourself from romance fraud. If something feels off, trust your instincts and seek help.

If you think you have been a victim of fraud report it to Action Fraud by visiting their web portal. Alternatively, you can call our non-emergency number 101 to report any information regarding ongoing fraud.

If you feel that you have been scammed and would like to speak to someone face to face please come into your local police station for a confidential chat. It is highly likely that it will be a known scam and you will not be alone. If your local police station is closed or you are unable to get there promptly, please do not delay. Call Action Fraud or Humberside police on the numbers below for advice.

If you think you might have been a victim of fraud report it to Action Fraud by visiting actionfraud.police.uk or by calling 0300 123 2040, alternatively call Humberside Police on 101. In an emergency or if a crime is in progress dial 999.

If you have information regarding those responsible for fraud, please contact Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111.

HMRC's top tips for avoiding scams are:

- Recognise the signs genuine organisations like banks and HMRC will never contact you out of the blue to ask for your PIN, password or bank details.
- Stay safe don't give out private information, reply to text messages, download attachments or click on links in emails you weren't expecting.
- Take action forward suspicious emails claiming to be from HMRC to phishing@hmrc.gsi.gov.uk and texts to 60599, or contact Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040 to report any suspicious calls or use their online fraud reporting tool.



- HMRC Debt management teams do contact members of the public by phone about paying outstanding debts.
- If a customer (or agent) isn't confident that the call is from HMRC, we will ask them to call back.
 Depending on the circumstances and to give the customer confidence it is actually HMRC calling, information may be disclosed to the caller which only HMRC is party to
- Calls from the majority of HMRC offices will leave caller identification data, i.e. the number the caller has used to contact you from

Never click on a link and if in doubt make your own independent enquiries.
